Farm Biosecurity

The Farm Biosecurity awareness campaign is a joint initiative of Animal Health Australia (AHA) and Plant Health Australia .

Their goal is to help producers reduce the risks posed by diseases, pests and weeds to their crops and livestock. This site provides information about on-farm biosecurity measures, which help prevent both endemic and exotic diseases, pests and weeds from entering and becoming established on farms. It encourages producers to identify risks to their livestock, crops and plant products, and to minimise those risks through good practices.

Producers are encouraged to check their properties regularly and, if they see anything unusual, to call the Emergency Animal Disease Watch Hotline on 1800 675 888 or the Exotic Plant Pest Hotline on 1800 084 881.

On the Alpaca Farm Biosecurity page you will find the tools to implement the simple, everyday biosecurity practices to protect the health of your livestock, limit production losses and help maintain market access for Australia's alpaca producers.

AII ALACA SHOWS

to be cancelled for the

remainder of 2020

The AAA have recently announced that the National Alpaca Show scheduled in August has been cancelled due to Covid-19 restrictions.

In addition all independent alpaca shows in 2020 have also been cancelled. Agricultural Shows are exempt, if they choose to run.

Should the government policy change significantly, exemptions may be granted to shows later in the year.



However do keep an eye out for details on a "mega" fleece show to be held towards the end of the year.

Fleece production process:-

There are several steps involved to take shorn alpaca fibre in it's raw form to transform it into finished product of purchasable and useable alpaca fleece.

1. CLASSING

Alpaca fibre needs to be sorted to meet the needs of it processors (classed). The main properties processor asses on are fibre diameter (micron), length and colour.

2. SCOURING

All natural fibres need to be scoured (washed). This removes dirt and grease from the fleeces. Alpaca fibre has a low grease content and will yield around 90% of it's initial fleece weight after scouring.

3. CARDING

Once alpaca fleece is scoured, the individual fibres need to be aligned; this is known as carding. This process will also remove some of the unwanted vegetable matter.

4. TOP MAKING

The fibres go through a finishing alignment called gilling before being combed into a product known as 'top'. This top has the appearance of a loose rope without the twist.

5. SPINNING INTO YARN

Tops are fed into spinning machines to make yarn for knitting or weaving. This is the last process in the chain before the fabric is manufactured.

<u>6. DYEING</u>

An advantage of alpaca fibre is that the lighter colours are easily dyed to suit contemporary fashion. The natural colours of alpaca are manufactured directly into end products.



There are a number of businesses around Australia that buy and process alpaca fleece.



<u>Joma Alpacas</u> - have had a small on farm shop for several years, we were often at local markets.






