Presidents Report

2019-2020

A lot has happened in the past 12 months.

12 months ago our President was Maddy Bissels and we were all sitting side by side, without face masks, at the Bunyip Community Hall.

Today I am your President; Maddy has moved to the Central region with her fiancé Jonathan Provis-Vincent and we are meeting on Zoom. Did anybody know what Zoom was 12 months ago? As you are all too aware we here in Victoria are currently in a State of Disaster with Stage 3 and Stage 4 lockdowns and night time curfews affecting our region.

Fortunately we managed to get most of our events complete in the year with the exception of Farm World. So all things considered we have been quite lucky. The first half of 2020 will see us not having an Alexander Show, Lardner Show or Sale Show, unless there are some massive changes in government policy. 2021 does not look all that promising for Berwick or Red Hill however it's probably a bit far out to predict, given the fluid Covid 19 situation. The Berwick Show society is assuming there will not be a publically attended show.

Our Committee is also having a major change with four of our long standing committee members standing down after many years of service to our region. Thank you Joy Skinner, Lezley Golding, Chris and Russell Pendlebury. Their departure will see some new faces and blood join our committee.

Things have also changed at a National level with the resignation of our elected President Andrew Munn who has taken a job in France. This sees the appointment of an Acting President Prue Walduck. The financial structure and procedures of the region have also changed dramatically with all the accounting, bill paying and reporting coming from our head office in Canberra. This will see a new way of managing and organising events, there will be different processes and procedures being put in place from Head office. So all event convenors will need to change some of their existing processes to meet the new head office requirements.



The new acting President has put in place monthly regional president zoom meetings so we now have a regular forum to discuss issues arising. So if anybody has any concerns please let me know with an email and I will raise your concerns.

National financial reports, the secretary distributed the current National financial situation and we can see that the National body did not have a good year. The major problem they have is lack of revenue, so it's up to us to encourage new members to join the association, for us to register all our animals. When we sell animals to a new breeder, we need to encourage them to join the association so you can transfer your animals across to their new stud. All these little events create small streams of revenue that all help the bottom line of the association and our region. Our new committee will be working on this in the year to come. Any event that we are lucky enough to organise needs to make a positive financial contribution to the region.

I hope the remainder of 2020 is good to you and we look forward to a more positive 2021.

2019/20 Treasurers Report

Please Refer to the 2019/20 Profit and Loss Statement and Balance sheet for details of year results. They show another good result this year with an operating profit of \$3359.93 and maintaining a reasonably healthy Balance sheet. The VER were able to run 5 Regional shows over the year, before the pandemic restrictions came into play. All of the shows returned a profit- congratulations to the Convenors for their diligent work. The cost of transport of pens to and from the Lardner Show incurred a significant cost (\$2420) for the Lardner Show, but great work by the Convenors enabled that cost to be covered. The Judges expenses for shows were not allocated to each show and is shown as a separate item.

The VER payments to Farm World were refunded and deposits paid by stall holders to VER were returned. It is important to note that VER Committee agreed to forgo half the Regions Capitation payments for 2019/20 from AAA to assist their financial position.

The future

From 1st of July 2020, the main bookkeeping / accounting function will be centralised in Canberra and a centralised Online MYOB system will be used. Processes for authorisation of payments and generation of invoices will still rest with the Region. The VER will still manage and monitor their own finances through the MYOB system. As part of many changes with the financial systems at



AAA from 1 July we will be charging GST on all Goods & Services (Shows, Events, Training, Merchandise, Advertising etc), it follows that the GST paid on purchase will now be claimed back in the Quarterly BAS process.

In addition, as of 1 July the deferred Judges Levy Increase (from January 2020) comes into effect and the Judges Levy is now \$4.00 for animal & \$2.00 for Fleece Entries. VER activity Plans for the 2020/21 year is still uncertain, but hopefully the Covid-19 cloud hanging over us will be clearer over the next couple of months!

Newsletter Editor Report

In April 2020 it was decided to reintroduce the VER eNewsletter, Victoria was in the midst of Covid 19 restrictions and all shows, training and social events had been cancelled.

The eNewsletter has been produced monthly with publications being emailed and also included on the VER website for the months of April, May, June, July and August.

It is always difficult to ascertain the success or otherwise of this type of communication, to date there have been approx. 10 people who have communicated that they were enjoying the newsletter

With minimal input from members, content has been sourced from social media, AgriFutures, AAA, VER Website, local product producers and other articles that may be deemed to be of interest to our members

I feel the newsletter has been beneficial during Covid 19 but expect to reduce the frequency to quarterly once other methods of getting together are back on the agenda.

Website and Social Media Report

Late in 2019 following advice from the AAA we were asked to move our website across to the AAA format. By early in the New Year the majority of historical data, meeting minutes etc were transferred over to the new format and the new website was launched.

Over the remainder of the year the website has been extended to include further local contact such as sections on Annual Awards, New to Alpacas, Alpaca Health, Open Farms, Alpaca Product and local content on the News and Events pages.

More recently the colour of the website pages have been changed to green to more clearly distinguish us from the central region.

RED Hill Show Report 7th March 2020 – David Daddo

While the unstable weather leading up to Red Hill Showday, gave many moments of concern – Saturday, 7th March was perfect.

Crowds topped the previous record of last year, and alpaca entries were up by 10%, supported by

the largest number of suris for a long time.

At the beginning of the day, with all exhibitors gathered in the ring for the pre-show meeting, we spent a quiet moment in reflection and acknowledgement of the late Bob McLeod's commitment and contribution to the Region.

The R J (Bob) McLeod tribute catalogue carried the following sentiments:

Bob McLeod – the consummate Show Convenor and Head Steward

Today's Alpaca Show at Red Hill, marks the closing of the Region's 2019/20 Show season – a series of five events, each of which for the first time in many, many years was held in the absence of a much respected, much loved personality. Through this Tribute Catalogue, we remember and reflect on the significant contribution made by Bob McLeod to the life of the AAA Victorian Eastern Region and in particular, to the development and progress of the Region's annual show calendar. Since the early days of the Region, two names have been closely linked with our show scene – the first being the late Bill Plunkett and the second being Bob McLeod, who took over the mantle of Chairman of the Region's Showing and Judging sub-committee on Bill's passing. In the fourteen years or so that have followed, we have been privileged to share our "show times" with Bob, who sadly passed away in September 2019, just a week or two before this year's Show season got underway. Today, at Red Hill, we are all beneficiaries of his professionalism and dedication. We thank Bob for the commitment so readily given and acknowledge the legacy that he has left with us.

As exhibitors returned to their penning areas, many spoke of their own connections with Bob and of the pleasure taken from the sentiments of this tribute.

The Pavilion readied itself for showtime. Judges were introduced, exhibitors looking smart in dress code black, assembled at the marshalling area – suris to be judged first.

With the Pavilion now fully dedicated to alpacas, and with the McLelland Gallery Spinners and our own Robyn Collett demonstrating the skill of turning fleece into product, our exhibitors and our product stallholders busily engaged themselves with an interested crowd, all day – answering the many questions on all things alpaca, as thousands of the ever-popular selfies were taken.

In the show ring, our judges – Natasha Clark, from the Bellarine Peninsula, in company with apprentice judge, Lisa Charteris from New Zealand, gave detailed and insightful reports in support of their judging decisions – delivered professionally and in a relaxed, friendly, informative style. Their communication to the individual exhibitor, fellow exhibitors and the visiting public was



appreciated by all, as was the ready smile and the willingness to pose for photographs with the championship winners throughout the day. They gave much and we are indebted to them.

On their outdoor site, a large contingent of our Alpaca Youth Paraders was on show throughout the day under judge, Louise Charman. A great showing and one which drew much attention from the general public. When not directly involved in their Stockmanship and Showmanship competition, the Paraders found time to supervise and mentor some 30-40 enthusiastic youngsters, largely aged 6-11 years, through the various elements of the Junior Handler event – as part of the Alpaca Section's scheduled activities.

We thank all who participated in bringing the Alpaca story to Red Hill – the exhibitors; the judges and stewards; the volunteer support teams of both the Alpaca Section and the Alpaca Youth Paraders; the visiting public and our hosts – the Red Hill A & H Society.

We congratulate the winners of the Alpaca Section's Supreme Champion awards and we thank veterinarian, Dr Belle Paffett, for joining us at our closing ceremony and presenting the trophies – kindly donated by Main Ridge Veterinary Clinic.
