VER Farm World. Thank you **Jenny Miles** for your dedication of being part of the organizing party since 1998, and in 2005, co-convener with Bob McLeod, then as sole co-convener since 2016.

Victorian Eastern Region has represented alpacas at Farm World, Lardner, Victoria for over 25 years. Every year VER breeders who are very passionate about alpacas, purchase a site in the Lakeside Pavilion to showcase alpacas (both huacaya and suri) and alpaca products. All the while availing themselves to answer the many questions from thousands of visitors who pass through the 'Alpaca Shed'. Just do the maths – 25 years, 4 days per show, regularly 55-60 thousand visitors per show. That is an enormous amount of information, exposure, promotion and cross-promotion of alpacas in general, and, more particularly, of all members' alpacas and related services in the Eastern Region. Every member of the VER has benefited from this in innumerable ways. Jenny and her team can be justifiably proud of their contribution to the industry.

Jenny began on the Farm World Working Party in 1998 at the encouragement of Brian Worcester with the then Convener Nic Veltjens. Bob McLeod was also a contributor to this group. Jenny's role was seeking local sponsorship as well as minute taker etc and set up. She then became an exhibitor herself in 1999

VER. began holding Fashion Parades in 2000 which ran until 2009, with two per day. It began with Sheila Hanson & Bodil Neilsen from A Touch of Alpaca, who co-ordinated the Fashion Parades until they sold the business. Adrian & Barbara Corkoran then co-ordinated it from there on. Jenny became a model along with most of her family as well as an exhibitor in this time.

Bob McLeod and Jenny took over as joint conveners in 2005 as Nic Veltjens retired. Bob was happy to be front man for the Committee while Jenny did all of the administrative side. (meetings, minutes, sponsorship, bookings etc)

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VER News

Farm World 2021

Considering the Covid restrictions in place the 2021 AAA VER exhibit was a great success for all of those who participated. Ten exhibitors over 13 sites located in Lakeside Pavilion in a slightly different layout saw an average of 400 people/hour pass through the shed based on the statistics from Farm World Committee. Sunday alone saw over 3,000 people pass through.

There was some resistance from the public due to having to scan the QR code or write their name down before entering and one way traffic through the pavilion and random sheep shearing demonstrations being held, still drew people in. Online ticket sales restricted the attendance to only 7,500 / day but each day was sold out.

For 2021 it was only a three day event with Saturday being a twilight event closing at 7pm. Farm World was true to its history with Saturday being wet and cold but as usual the Lakeside Pavilion was a great shelter for all at this time.



On further discussion with exhibitors, general enquiries came in the form of questions about pets, the use of guards and with what animals, breeding stock, shearing, craft classes and fibre enquiries. The locations of some of these enquires came from Bellarine Peninsula, East Gippsland, Ballarat, Buxton, outer metropolitan Melbourne, Gippsland in general, Lakes Entrance, Yarra Valley and Gembrook just to name a few.

Sales over the three days was not just limited to alpaca products (knitwear, throw rugs, scarves, toys, halters, craft items) but raw and spun fleeces and animals.

Already I have had notification of animal sales generated from discussions at Farm World from non-exhibitors, they were listed in the VER breeders updated listing enclosed in the AAA VER Q & A handout, many of which were distributed during the three days. When we had enquiries for animals or help with their existing animals, we ask where they are located and then put them in touch with someone in their area.

I urge VER to ensure this event is supported in future as "Alpacas at Farm World provide a great service to the alpaca industry and should be supported by the AAA."

After being involved in this event (from part of the working party in 1998, to minute taker, co-convenor, sole convenor) for over twenty years I feel I can no longer commit to being the convenor any longer and feel that 2021 was the last for me.

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Quad bikes and side-by-sides under the spotlight in wrap up of 2020 farm safety stats

A familiar tale sees quad bikes and tractors continue as the leading cause of death and injury on Australian farms, according to annual statistics released by AgriFutures Australia. Despite the increased safety attention on quad bikes last year, the number of deaths continues to rise.

Figures collated by AgHealth Australia's National Farm Injury Coronial Database revealed 58 on-farm deaths were reported in Coronial Database revealed 58 on-farm deaths were reported in 2020*, the same number of cases reported in 2019. Quad bikes and tractors again reported as the leading causes of injury. AgriFutures Australia funds research to enhance farm health and safety as part of its National Rural Issues Program, working alongside the Rural Safety and Health Alliance (RSHA). The 2020 report Non-intentional Farm Related Incidents in Australia highlights the total on-farm deaths, causes of injury, fatalities by age and gender, as well as the estimated economic impact of fatal injuries.

Using data collated by AgHealth Australia's National Farm Injury Coronial Database based at the University of Sydney, the report aims to provide comprehensive evidence to build preventative approaches for the safety and wellbeing of people in Australian agriculture.

AgriFutures Australia Senior Manager, Rural Futures, Jennifer Medway says that while the statistics show progress is being made in some areas, its alarming to see the increase in deaths from quad bikes and side by sides.

"Side by sides have long been considered a safer option to

quads, but the numbers don't back that up. They are only now increasing in popularity and are already making a sizable contribution to the death toll," said Ms Medway.

"In fact, well over a third of on-farm deaths in 2020 are directly attributable to quad bikes and side by sides alone. If you add tractors into the mix, these three vehicles shockingly account for over half of all on-farm deaths."

This is a challenge not lost on the rural Research Development Corporations (RDC) which fund research through the RSHA to review the data and use an evidence-based approach to improve safety across our agricultural, fisheries and forestry industries.

RSHA Executive Officer, Andrew Barrett said the figures are another sobering reminder that the cost of human life incurred in the production of our food and fibre is still too high.

As a sector so proud of innovation and progress, we must be equally concerned and focused on why so little has changed in our health and safety record over time," said Mr Barrett.

"The commitment to change has already begun with leadership from the Minister, government, National Farmers' Federation, RDCs, and some of our peak bodies."

"Other non-agricultural industries have accepted that 'inherently dangerous' is not a condition of work but a call to action. Actions that target known and persistent risks, using risk controls proven to reduce the potential for death and serious injury need to be enforced if we are going to see any noticeable change in these statistics.
